LB6900	Cat A LB	Garvamore, Garva Bridge Over River Spey (St George's Bridge)	Built in 1731-32, a twin arched rubble bridge with long centre section between arches springing from rocky outcrop in centre of river. Tooled rubble arch rings and parapet cope; heavy rubble buttresses to both sides; iron repair braces to arches. General Wade's first double-arched bridge carries the military road from Dalwhinnie to Fort Augustus. General Wade named it St George's Bridge, though that name is now rarely used. It used to be a scheduled monument as well as an LB. Scheduled on 24/05/1971 and descheduled on 23/03/2016.
MHG23344	HER	Glendoemore	A farmstead, comprising one roofed and one unroofed building is depicted on the 1st edition of the 6-inch map (Inverness-shire 1874, sheet lxviii), but it is not shown on the current edition of the OS 1:10000 map.
MHG27108	HER	Coire a'Ghiubhas	A farmstead depicted on the 1st edition of the OS 6-inch map, comprising two unroofed buildings and two enclosures, the westernmost of which is a field. The buildings are on hummocks above a river terrace on the north bank of the Spey. The westernmost enclosure (150m east/west) comprises an earth and stone bank encircling a gravel terrace west of the buildings.
MHG27109	HER	Coire a'Ghiubhas	Footings of a two-roomed roadside cabin survive as drystone walls and earthen banks. Depicted on the 1st Edition OS map.
MHG34491	HER	Dalwhinnie - Fort Augustus Military Road	Route of military road, now tarred. The tarmac road follows the line of the military road, but no obvious physical remains of the eighteenth-century road are visible.
HA1	n/a	Garvamore	Two roofed buildings and a large enclosed field on west bank of the Spey, near Garva Bridge, are depicted on the 1st Edition OS. The footings of one building can be discerned as a sub-rectangular depression, and traces of earthen banks define the field.
HA2	n/a	Allt Gilbe	Probable shieling hut. Sub-rectangular structure defined by earth & stone footings. First identified by 2014 buried cable walkover survey, and, confirmed in 2017. Currently marked out for protection from buried cable works.

HA3	n/a	Allt Coire Iain Oig	Probable shieling comprising a small enclosure and stone footings of building identified in Oct 2014 buried cable survey. Not depicted on 1st or 2nd Edition OS maps.
HA4	n/a	Feith Talagain	Stone footings of up to eight shieling huts, identified in Oct 2014 buried cable survey. Not depicted on 1st or 2nd Edition OS maps.
